The "3 Cs" of Farm to School







Classroom

Farm to School education provides real-life context for learning across all disciplines inside classroom and outside in school gardens.

Cafeteria

Farm to school programs strive to show that school nutrition and the cafeteria are integral to the school day and the education of the whole student.

Community

Farm to school strengthens the community and local economy. "Local" is defined by YOU and your school community!

Funding Opportunity Overview: MA FRESH



MA FRESH (Farming Reinforces Education and Student Health)

- New statewide farm to school and farm to early care grant program
 - Administered by the Mass. Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE)
- Funded with COVID Recovery Funds
- Approximately \$570,000 is available with awards of up to \$50,000 per applicant
- Project activities can span through June 30, 2025
- MA FRESH Grant funding can not be used to continue existing activities. Applicants must demonstrate that funds will be utilized to initiate or expand farm to school activities.

Eligibility: MA FRESH

Applicants must be sponsors of:

- The National School Lunch Program (NSLP)
- Child and Adult Care Feeding Program (CACFP).

Eligible entities include:

- K-12 schools
- Early education centers
- Government, for profit, and community-based organizations that sponsor NSLP or CACFP

Grant Award Tracks: MA FRESH

Grant Track	Grant Size	Applicant	Objectives
New K-12 Farm to School Initiative Grants	\$5,000 - \$50,000	NSLP Sponsors	To support the startup of integrated farm to school programming in the K-12 setting. This is for K-12 applicants that do not have any active, formalized farm to school efforts that integrate local food, agricultural education and student health into curriculum or meal service.
Expanding K-12 Farm to School Initiative Grants	\$5,000 - \$50,000	NSLP sponsors	To support the expansion of integrated farm to school programming in the K-12 setting. This is for K-12 applicants engaged in formal farm to school efforts and would like to broaden the number of students, teachers, staff, etc, impacted by these efforts.

Grant Award Tracks - New Farm to School Programs

Applicants will apply in the "new" farm to school grant track if, at the time of application, they:

- Actively engage in none or only one of the Farm to School "Three C's":
 - Classroom/School Garden
 - Cafeteria
 - Community
- Have actively engaged in two or three of the three C's in the past but have been dormant in this programming for the last 3 years or more
 - Ex: In 2018, an elementary school utilized their school garden in the classroom, incorporated locally grown foods in school lunch and hosted afterschool family cooking classes. In 2020, all programming stopped due to COVID-19 and has not re-started to date. This program would be considered dormant, and is eligible to apply as a "New K-12 Farm to School Initiative."

Project Activities: MA FRESH



Eligible Activities

Grants are designed to fund the startup or expansion of farm to school activities, including, but not limited to:

- Kitchen equipment used to prepare local food for school meals
- Professional development for kitchen staff in preparing fresh meals using local ingredients
- Professional development for educators around adding food literacy lessons or garden activities to school curriculum
- New staff hours dedicated to farm to school integration
- Infrastructure and supplies for garden, culinary or food system activities (examples: lumber for garden beds, cutting boards, seeds, food system children's books)

Meal Site Data

- Applicants will be asked if their application is on behalf of:
 - A single K-12 school or a collection of specific, individual schools within a district/NSLP sponsorship OR
 - An entire school district, encompassing all sites

Meal Site Data

Based on the type of application, the following NSLP program information is required if application is tied to single school or subset of schools within a district, or if it is an application intended to have reach across the entire district. Example

Meal Site Details

In your application, describe:

- Management structure self-operated, food service management company, vended, etc.
- Participation percentages for your meal programs
- Preparation method -- heat and serve, cooking with unprocessed ingredients, a mix
- Service styles
- Program or menu highlights, specifically local foods (if applicable)



The Guild of St. Agnes in Worcester utilized MA FRESH funds to equip their new early education center with kitchen equipment.

Proposal Components

Project Description Highlighting New Activities 250 words max

- Introduce your project
- Describe how the proposed project initiates new activities
- Distinct scope, capacity, offerings, etc. must be articulated (clarify what is new vs. existing/continuation)
- Strong applications will connect food system education to the availability of nutritious, unprocessed or minimally processed local ingredients served in school or early education meal programs

Proposal Components

Project Impact 250 words max

- Expand on the specific, quantitative outcomes shared in the workplan table
- How will the implementation of this grant impact students, staff and the school community?
- How do your proposed activities support the grant project goals of "farming reinforcing education and student health?

Application Highlights: External Collaborators

Proposal Components

- If activities in your proposal will be completed by an external collaborator such as a food system non-profit, local farm, or volunteer organization – please describe their role and experience
- All contracted partners (partners that will receive grant funding outlined in the budget)
 must provide a letter of support describing their involvement in the project
- Additional letters of support beyond contracted partners that complement an applicant's proposal by providing context, illustrating stakeholder support or demonstrating informal, non-contracted plans, are welcome but not required


Proposal Components

• Budget

- Projects may last until June 30, 2025
- For projects lasting longer than June 30, 2024, two separate budgets, separated by fiscal year
 - Fiscal Year One: Grant Start (Estimated Early Spring 2024) June 30, 2024
 - Fiscal Year Two: July 1, 2024 June 30, 2025


Budget Narrative 150 words max

- Strong budget narratives will show how each line item or budget category relates directly to your project description





June 30, 2024





June 30, 2024






Application Process: MA FRESH

Application Process: Massachusetts FRESH

- Email a completed application with required forms and supporting documents to <u>margaret.c.nowak@mass.gov</u>
- Any staff member can complete and submit the grant application, however, the grant application must be signed by:
 - NSLP Program Operator
 - Grant Administrative Lead
 - Superintendent or Executive Director
- Check grant Q&A for continual guidance (updates released weekly)
